



Leadership in A.A.: Ever a Vital Need

(Excerpts from **Bill W.'s** article in the April 1959 Grapevine. See Concept IX, page 36 of "Twelve Concepts for World Service" for the full article)

Somewhere in our literature there is a statement to this effect: "Our leaders do not drive by mandate: they lead by example." In effect, we are saying to them, "Act for us, but don't boss us."...

Therefore, a leader in A.A. service is a man (or woman) who can personally put principles, plans, and policies into such dedicated and effective action that the rest of us want to back him up and help him with his job. When a leader power-drives us badly, we rebel; but when he too meekly becomes an order-taker and he exercises no judgment of his own — well, he really isn't a leader at all....

Good leadership originates plans, policies, and ideas for the improvement of our Fellowship and its service. But in new and important matters, it will nevertheless consult widely before taking decisions and actions. Good leadership will also remember that a fine plan or idea can come from anybody, anywhere. Consequently, good leadership will often discard its own cherished plans for others that are better, and it will give credit to the source....

Good leadership never passes the buck. Once assured that it has, or can obtain, sufficient general backing, it freely takes decisions and puts them into action forthwith, provided, of course, that such action be within the framework of its defined authority and responsibility....

Another qualification for leadership is give-and-take, the ability to compromise cheerfully whenever a proper compromise can cause a situation to progress in what appears to be the right direction. Compromise comes hard to us all-or nothing drunks. Nevertheless, we must never lose sight of the fact that progress is nearly always characterized by a series of improving compromises. We cannot, however, compromise always. Now and then, it is truly necessary to stick flatfooted to one's conviction about an issue until it is settled. These are situations for keen timing and careful discrimination as to which course to take....

Leadership is often called upon to face heavy and sometimes long-continued criticism. This is an acid test. There are always the constructive critics, our friends indeed. We ought never fail to give them a careful hearing. We should be willing to let them modify our opinions or change them completely. Often, too, we shall have to disagree and then stand fast without losing their friendship.

Greetings,

I'm writing to inform the fellowship of the upcoming Central Office Steering Committee elections to be held on November 2, 2021. The elections will be held at the Central Office during the COI meeting. This letter contains a brief description of the duties of each position, the term of office, and information related to the voting procedure according to the Central Office Bylaws.

Item 1: Steering Committee**Steering Committee**

The Steering Committee shall be established to oversee AACO administrative matters and provide direction to the office manager. The Steering Committee shall be responsible to the AACO. The members of the Steering Committee shall be the four officers of AACO, the office manager, and chairpersons of Conventions, Public Information, Treatment and Corrections and the Intergroup social meetings. These members should fulfill their individual responsibilities in accordance with the scope of their duties as hereinafter described. With the exception of the paid office manager, Steering Committee members shall serve without compensation. The members of the Steering Committee shall not represent any single group. However, in the case of conflict of interests, non-participation in the discussion and abstention from voting shall be observed by this Steering Committee member.

Qualification and Eligibility

A member of the Steering Committee shall be sober for an uninterrupted period of at least three years before and during Steering Committee Service and be a resident of the area served. There shall be no waivers of these requirements under any circumstances.

Election Process

Annual elections to fill completed Steering Committee positions shall be held during the November meeting of the Intergroup. Newly elected Steering Committee members shall take office effective the following 1st January.

The chairpersons of conventions, public information, treatment and corrections and Intergroup social meetings shall be elected by the Intergroup.

Each Steering Committee position to be filled under the rotation process, as called for in Section III. B.4 of these bylaws, shall be filled by separate election. All persons attending the meeting shall be asked to stand. Those not having the required length of sobriety shall be asked to be seated. Of those standing, those who are not willing to run for any position or who do not possess the necessary level of knowledge and experience shall be asked to be seated. Those who remain standing shall be identified and announced by the chairperson as candidates for the vacant positions. For any specific vacant position, the candidate receiving the greatest number of votes cast for that position shall be elected. In case of a tie, the voting shall continue until one of the candidates receives a simple majority.

All members of the Intergroup, namely, the representatives and Steering Committee members present, shall be entitled to cast one vote on each round of voting. Where necessary, "The Third Legacy Procedure", as described in Chapter one of the A.A. Service Manual pp. 522-523 may be used.

Note: All electors (either COI, Alternate COI, or current Steering Committee member) are required to have attended the two Steering Committee, or the two COI Meetings immediately preceding the election (September, and October meetings).

Positions and Terms of Office:

Vice-chair: Two-year term

Treasurer: Two-year term

Secretary: Two-year term

Tristate: One-year term

Intergroup: One-year term

PI/CPC: One-year term

Treatment and Corrections: One -year term

The duties, and responsibilities are detailed below. For more information, please feel free to contact Lisa M., Central Office Manager, Maurice W., Jr., Steering Committee Chairman, or Kim S., Steering Committee Vice-chair.

Chairperson

The Chairperson shall plan and preside at all Steering Committee and Intergroup meetings and shall keep informed of AACO operations and general A.A. matters by regularly meeting and conversing with the office manager. In the event the chairperson is unable to attend a meeting, the vice chairperson shall preside.

Vice Chairperson

The vice chairperson shall work directly with the chairperson to keep informed of AACO operations and general A.A. matters, chair all meetings from which the chairperson is absent and coordinate any AACO special fundraising. In the absence of a standing Public Information Chairperson, the Vice Chairperson shall coordinate public information and professional community activities. In the event the chairperson resigns the vice chairperson shall become the chairperson for the remainder of the term.

Secretary

The secretary shall record the minutes of the Steering Committee meetings and present them at the following Steering Committee meeting for approval, shall maintain attendance records of Steering Committee meetings, and shall record or cause to be recorded the minutes of Intergroup meetings and submit them for approval at the following regular meeting of the Intergroup. In the absence of the secretary, the chairperson shall delegate a person to record the minutes of such meeting.

Treasurer

The treasurer shall review all financial records and reports of AACO, oversee the preparation and timely filing of all governmental required returns and reports, and regularly report directly to the Steering Committee and Intergroup and, through a monthly newsletter or other means, to the A.A. fellowship the financial operations and condition of AACO. The treasurer should have a working knowledge of accounting through the profit and loss statement and strong computer skills.

Office Manager

The office manager shall administer AACO in order to accomplish its purpose as set out in Section II. B of these bylaws and be responsible and accountable to the Intergroup through the Steering Committee for the achievement of that purpose. Upon vacancy of the office manager position, the chairperson shall temporarily fill the position to the extent feasible until an office manager replacement is selected by the Intergroup and subsequently appointed by the Steering Committee.

Chairperson of Conventions

The chairperson of conventions shall form a convention committee and also assist the Steering Committee chairperson in the performance of their responsibilities; coordinate and report all convention progress and details to the Steering Committee and Intergroup; set up necessary sub-committees to organize and stage an annual Tri-State convention to be held in the fall (suggested sub-committees to include program, convention facilities, transportation, and any other the Intergroup requests); and make financial arrangements. The convention chairperson and/or Steering Committee chairperson shall be authorized along with the Treasurer to handle any disbursements of money related to the convention with two signatures required on all checks.

A separate checking account shall be maintained and reported to the Steering Committee. A reserve (amount to be determined) shall be maintained in the convention account. Any excess shall be transferred to the account of AACO. This procedure will help to maintain a base fund for future conventions. The Tri-State convention is to be funded at least in part by registration fees (the amount to be determined by the convention committee). An annual report to the Steering Committee will be prepared by the chairperson of conventions following the settlement of all debts of the convention. Any A.A. member including any Intergroup members may serve on the convention committee.

Chairperson of Public Information

The purpose of public information is to carry the A.A. message to the general public through the media (newspaper, magazines, radio, television, etc.); also, to alcoholics through those who are in a position to help them (e.g. wife, husband, doctor, etc.). Members of public information committees frequently visit schools and talk to students about A.A. This chairperson is to assist the Intergroup chairperson in the performance of their responsibilities, coordinate speakers for non-A.A. meetings, assist the media with inquiries, periodically update A.A. meeting schedules for the media, and follow general A.A. guidelines.

Chairperson of Intergroup Social Meetings

The duties of the chairperson of Intergroup social meetings is to assist the Steering Committee chairperson in the performance of their responsibilities; assist host groups(s) with each monthly social meeting conducted on the first Saturday night (8pm) of each month at the designated address; maintain a listing of participating groups to host or co-host the Intergroup social meetings, notify each host or co-host a minimum of thirty (30) days in advance, and notify all groups as to the host group, speaker (if possible), date, time, and type of function, and notify AACO for inclusion in the newsletter; assist with the coordination of collections and payments related to the Intergroup social meetings. With approval of AACO they may hold special meetings such as a New Year's Eve dance. This chairperson shall encourage all non-participating groups to participate in hosting or co-hosting Intergroup social meetings.

Thank you for being willing to serve our AA community. I can assure you that the experience will be very rewarding.






THE AA PREAMBLE

Alcoholics Anonymous

is a fellowship of people who share their experience, strength and hope with each other that they may solve their common problem and help others to recover from alcoholism.

The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking. There are no dues or fees for AA membership; we are self-supporting through our own contributions. AA is not allied with any sect, denomination, politics, organization or institution; does not wish to engage in any controversy, neither endorses nor opposes any causes. Our primary purpose is to stay sober and help other alcoholics to achieve sobriety.

Step Ten: Continued to Take Personal Inventory.

Examine My Motives for All That I Do.



If someone were to ask me what brought me to the doors of the Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A.) my answer would be: "Alcohol had got the best of me, I was desperately circling the drain, and I didn't want to die young". Not everyone that comes to A.A. has that degree of desperation. I got sober on October 15th, 1969 and that was just before Alcoholics were being offered Rehabilitation clinics. Up to that point most of our members came here were looking for answers. The success rate at that time, according to the foreword to the second addition of the (Big Book), Alcoholics Anonymous, it says that 50% of those who came here looking for answers got sober and never drank again 25% got sober after a few relapses and stayed that way and the other 25% showed improvement. To me, 75% sounds like a surprisingly good ratio of success. The only requirement for A.A. membership is a desire to stop drinking. (Tradition Three) Not everyone who comes to A.A. from the Court System or from a Rehab environment has the same amount of desperation as those original members had. This does not mean that they are not invited, for we treat them with respect but a large percentage of them do relapse and we welcome them back with open arms so as not to be considered an A.A. failure and eventually many of them do stay sober. The depth of the desperation is often consistent with the depth of thoroughness a person is willing to go through as he takes the steps and when I was faced with this suggestion that I do a Fearless and Thorough Moral Inventory in the fourth step, I began to resist and did what I would call a shallow facade just to get my ticket punched. Being in the Navy at the time I was abruptly flown out to the western Pacific during the Vietnam War and assigned to a tanker replenishing the fuel on ships in the Tonkin gulf Fleet and I had four months to think about what I was going to do on my returned home. My conscience told me to discard my original inventory and do it right the second time around. That I think, is what made the rest of this program easy for me. Being willing to take responsibility for all those disgusting behaviors of yesterday and to make restitution has been the answer to all those alcoholic behaviors in the past. If we have completed a good 4th and 5th step and again on the 8th and 9th step, how do we approach the tenth step which suggest that we continue to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.

Early in my sobriety my wife came home from an Al-Anon meeting excited about the topic they shared. She said that "We should examine our motives for all the things we do" and that made perfect sense to me. I have been living a life based on Unselfish Principles and I am never finished examining my motives. All my out-side behaviors (short-comings) are the result of my thinking (motives) and so long as I am willing to continue this path it has taken all the fight out of me. Selfishness--self-Centeredness! That, we think, is the root of our troubles. Driven by a hundred forms of fear, self-delusion, self-seeking, and self-pity we step on the toes of our fellows, and they retaliate. (BB pg. 62) What a Profound statement! Living a life based upon Unselfish Motives has restored my self-esteem and the final and most important result is peace of mind. Never thought that would happen!!! This is my understanding of Step Ten.
