Shouting From the Housetops

He couldn't wait to tell everyone about his AA membership! Hmm...maybe not a great idea

There seems to be a certain progression that occurs in the life of any alcoholic who comes to AA to get sober, to stay sober and to stay close to the Fellowship and the program. Before many of us came into AA we didn't want anyone to know that we were alcoholic, and we did our darnedest to keep it under wraps.

When I finally crawled out from under the rock of alcohol and found my way into the Fellowship—the program that could help me get sober and maintain sobriety in the private and protected environment of the group—I wanted to tell everyone. After all, it was miraculous that AA had done what I could not do for myself or through any other means. As our "Twelve and Twelve" book states, we wanted to "shout AA from the housetops."

That may seem like a positive and worthwhile action to take, especially since there's such a great need to bring recovery to the alcoholic and, since AA has worked for me, why wouldn't it work for everyone else?

There are two major flaws in this line of thinking: 1) that I know what's best for others; and 2) that I will remain a positive example for others to follow in the future.

First, we learn in AA that this program works for the alcoholic who wants it and is willing to do the work involved in the recovery process. Not all alcoholics want it, and even if they do, they may not be on the specific timeline to recover that we in AA may think that they need. It takes some of us (including myself) some time to develop the desire to stop, build the trust that AA will really work and draw on a willingness to go through with the program.

Secondly, how do you know that you will stay sober in the future? Sobriety is out of your hands now and it's in the hands of the Fellowship, the program, and essentially, God. And if I don't take care of my daily reprieve (to do what I need to do to stay connected to God) then I might not stay sober, and what kind of example would I then be setting for the newcomer?

The bottom line is that anonymity is not about me. It's about setting a course to ensure the survival of the Fellowship and setting the stage to bring the newcomer in, all while providing the safety and security that anonymity brings. In other words, principles before personalities.

I know that part of me wants credit for work done. I want recognition and prestige. And sometimes I feel the need to be noticed. But I'm not an evangelist or a reformer, or even an AA authority with titles to flaunt. I'm just someone with an opportunity to serve as I have been taught. As a result of service, I've been given more than I feel I deserve—sobriety and peace of mind.

TRADITION TWELVE: (The Long Form)



It reminds us that we are to place principles before personalities; that we are actually to practice genuine humility. This to the end that our great blessings may never spoil us; that we shall forever live in thankful contemplation of Him who presides over us all.

Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

- 1. Why is it a good idea for me to place the common welfare of all AA members before individual welfare? What would happen to *me* if AA as a whole disappeared?
- 2. When I do not trust AA's current servants, who do I wish had the authority to straighten them out?
- 3. In my opinions of and remarks about other AAs, am I implying membership requirements other than a desire to stay sober?
- 4. Do I ever try to get a certain AA group to conform to my standards, not its own?
- 5. Have I a personal responsibility in helping an AA group fulfill its primary purpose? What is my part?
- 6. Does my personal behavior reflect the Sixth Tradition or belie it?
- 7. Do I do all I can do to support AA financially? When is the last time I anonymously gave away a Grapevine subscription?
- 8. Do I complain about certain AAs' behavior especially if they are paid to work for AA? Who made me so smart?
- 9. Do I fulfill all AA responsibilities in such a way as to please privately even my own conscience? Really?
- 10. Do my utterances always reflect the Tenth Tradition, or do I give AA critics real ammunition?
- 11. Should I keep my AA membership a secret, or reveal it in private conversation when that may help another alcoholic (and therefore me)? Is my brand of AA so attractive that other drunks want it?
- 12. What is the real importance of me among more than a million AAs?

CONCEPT TWELVE: "General Warranties of the Conference: in all its proceedings, the General Service Conference shall observe the spirit of the A.A. Tradition, taking great care that the Conference never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus am ample reserve, be its prudent financial principle; that none of the Conference Members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any others: that all important decisions be reached by discussion vote, and whenever possible, by substantial unanimity; that no Conference action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Conference may act for the service of Alcoholics Anonymous, it shall never perform acts of government; and that like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous, which it serves, the Conference itself will always remain democratic in thought and action."

The Perfect Night

Just as the midnight mass bells were ringing, he and his partner were heading to jail By Charles M., Harbert, Mich.

When friends asked what I was doing for Christmas Eve 2019, I smiled and said, "Going to jail." A friend and I were taking an AA meeting to incarcerated fellows at our local county jail. I had even added something self-serving like, "I can't think of a better place to be on Christmas Eve."

Well, I sure didn't feel that way on that dark and cold December night in Michigan when I first arrived in the parking lot opposite the forbidding institution. I really wanted to be home with my wife and our new cat and the gas fireplace we had given ourselves for Christmas. Plus, I was feeling more than a little sorry for myself because the Christmas Eve jail AA service meant missing midnight mass, which at our church began at 8 p.m. to allow the aging faithful to get to bed at a decent hour.

Sure, I could go to mass the next day on Christmas morning, and that would certainly count with the church, but I would miss all the magic of midnight mass. And wouldn't you know, the church on the other side of the jail's parking lot rang its bells, summoning folks to come inside and worship on a cold, dark night. I looked over longingly at the warm, cozy church's glowing stained-glass windows and watched worshippers eagerly climb the church steps in anticipation of some midnight marvels. Oh, how I wanted to join them.

But then I looked over at my partner in our Twelfth Step work and decided I couldn't let him down. There had to be at least two of us outsiders for there to be an AA meeting at the jail. And, well, wasn't there also that line from Step Twelve about carrying "this message to alcoholics." I knew that I had a solemn duty to carry the message of my recovery to my incarcerated brothers on this side of the parking lot.

The church bells rang again, reminding me that I had a choice to make, and make it I did that cold, clear night in Michigan. My partner and I took the AA meeting into the county jail on Christmas Eve—and what a meeting it turned out to be!

I don't have to tell you, because you know, what happens when we AAs share our experience, strength and hope with one another. Serenity happens...peace prevails. The Promises are fulfilled among us, sometimes quickly, sometimes slowly. they will always materialize if we work for them. And we band of brothers—in green jump suits, blue jeans and flannel shirts—worked for them.

Because it was Christmas Eve, we got extra time on our meeting because the correctional staff was short-handed for the holiday. It was all too beautiful.

Once back in the parking lot, my partner in crime and I wished one another a Merry Christmas and agreed we couldn't have found a better way to spend this night. And don't you know, I went to our church on Christmas Day and got so much more out of it because I had been saved by the bells the night before.




